Solar Eclipse - Safety Message from Vancouver Coastal Health

As many of you will know, On Monday, April 8, 2024, a solar eclipse will occur when the Moon moves between the Sun and the Earth. In the VCH region, this event will be a partial eclipse, expected to start around 10:40 am and end around 12:20 pm.

While it is dangerous to look at the Sun anytime, the risk of harm is higher during a solar eclipse because we are more tempted to look. Our natural reflexes, such as turning away from the Sun or reducing the amount of light entering our eyes, may be less effective due to the reduced light during the event. Even during a partial eclipse, the Sun's intense radiation can cause severe damage to the eyes. It's crucial to avoid looking directly at the Sun during the eclipse, especially for children, as their eyes let in more light to the retina than adult eyes. Young children and other vulnerable persons in care may not fully understand the risks or be able to follow safety directives and may require more supervision.

In order to avoid the risk of permanent damage, it is reasonable to keep young children and other vulnerable persons in care indoors during the eclipse and put the blinds down. You can watch the eclipse live <u>online</u>. Should your facility choose to organize a learning opportunity around this, such as viewing with a pinhole projector, recommendations for safe watching should be followed.

- **Avoid direct viewing:** Never look directly at the eclipse under any circumstances.
- **Only use safe viewers:** Only view the eclipse if you have safe viewers and filters that meet the international standard ISO 12312-2.
- **Avoid homemade filters:** Do not use homemade filters, sunglasses, ski goggles, camera lenses, smoked glass, photographic film, or x-ray film by themselves or in combination with a binocular or telescope.
- **Pinhole projector:** If you don't have eclipse viewers that meet the international standard, create a pinhole projector and focus on the projected image, not the sun itself.
- Always supervise children and other vulnerable persons in care.

To prepare for this natural phenomenon the students will be remaining indoors between 10:40am and 12:30pm. Their recess times will be modified to accommodate for the eclipse. They will have an opportunity to experience the eclipse through NASA's live stream. The teachers will review risks and safety directives with the students. The classroom windows will be covered with the blinds down to avoid the sun's intense radiation.

A **solar eclipse** occurs when the <u>Moon</u> passes between <u>Earth</u> and the <u>Sun</u>, thereby obscuring the view of the Sun from a small part of Earth, totally or partially. Such an alignment occurs approximately every six months, during the <u>eclipse season</u> in its <u>new moon</u> phase, when the Moon's orbital plane is closest to <u>the plane of Earth's orbit.</u> In a total <u>eclipse</u>, the disk of the Sun is fully obscured by the Moon. In <u>partial and annular eclipses</u>, only part of the Sun is obscured. Unlike a <u>lunar eclipse</u>, which may be viewed from anywhere on the <u>night</u> side of Earth, a solar eclipse can only be viewed from a relatively small area of the world. As such, although total solar eclipses occur somewhere on Earth every 18 months on average, they recur at any given place only once every 360 to 410 years.

If the Moon were in a perfectly circular orbit and in the same orbital plane as Earth, there would be total solar eclipses once a month, at every new moon. Instead, because the Moon's orbit is <u>tilted</u> at about 5 degrees to Earth's orbit, its shadow usually misses Earth. Solar (and lunar) eclipses therefore happen only during <u>eclipse seasons</u>, resulting in at least two, and up to five, solar eclipses each year, no more than two of which can be total. Total eclipses are more rare because they require a more precise alignment between the centers of the <u>Sun</u> and <u>Moon</u>, and because the Moon's <u>apparent size</u> in the sky is sometimes too small to fully cover the Sun.

An eclipse is a <u>natural phenomenon</u>. In some ancient and modern cultures, solar eclipses were attributed to <u>supernatural</u> causes or regarded as bad <u>omens</u>. Astronomers' predictions of eclipses began in China as early as the 4th century BC; eclipses hundreds of years into the future may now be predicted with high accuracy.

Looking directly at the Sun can lead to permanent eye damage, so special eye protection or indirect viewing techniques are used when viewing a solar eclipse. Only the total phase of a total solar eclipse is safe to view without protection. Enthusiasts known as eclipse chasers or umbraphiles travel to remote locations to see solar eclipses. [4][5]
